## Oromill Lumber

So I dropped by Oromill to check things out. They are on Philadelphia near Whittier Blvd. The City beautification people won't let them put up a sign, so they are a little hard to find. I spoke with a lady there. She said they had moved from a previous location off Washington Blvd. several years ago. That might be the place I used to go to.

They have lots of construction lumber that looks to be of good quality. I asked about hardwoods. They said they only had poplar and oak, but could order other types. I bought a piece of light colored wood that seemed quite heavy for poplar and looked more like ash to me. Anyway, I paid for poplar. They also had pre-primed pine and various moldings.

Inside the store they have a great hardware and tool collection. Big selection of things like levels, hammers, files, etc. There were skilled labor, workman types buying stuff in there, which I considered a good sign. Lots of stuff you may not find in other stores. So, it is probably a place for professionals to buy wood and tools. The guy next to me bought a sledge hammer I couldn't lift with a crane.

I assume their prices are high, but the quality seems better than box stores and the selection is bigger than I've seen elsewhere. With Battles and Orchard closing, this is a place to keep in mind. They had small power tools but no stationary tools, at least that I saw. Combine this with Harbor Freight at the other end of the spectrum and you should be able to find anything at any price point. Good stuff.
